

Eight Action Areas

Through a series of strategic planning activities with Graduate College staff, the Graduate College Executive Committee, and our graduate student advisory group, the following eight areas were identified as priority action areas for continued excellence in graduate education.

Diversity

Establish the Sloan University Center of Exemplary Mentoring (UCEM)

With a grant from the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation, we provide support for underrepresented minority (URM) doctoral students in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) fields. During this three-year grant, fifty Sloan UCEM Scholars will be recruited and fully funded. Additionally, these scholars will receive mentoring and programs to help them thrive.

IMPACT: This initiative helps attract and retain URM students in STEM fields.

Protect funding for URM graduate students

We are developing a sustainable strategy for protecting mission-critical funds that have supported our Education Equity Programs since 1998.

IMPACT: The loss of these funds would have a catastrophic impact on our ability to attract and retain URM graduate students, leading to the elimination or drastic reduction in key programs such as the Summer Research Opportunities Program (SROP), the Summer PreDoctoral Institute (SPI), and greatly reduce URM fellowships for outstanding doctoral students.

Help programs recruit URM students into graduate programs

In addition to the campus visit programs that we currently offer to help academic programs recruit URM students, we will collect data related to recruitment, application, admissions, and enrollment to share with graduate programs on campus.

IMPACT: Collecting and sharing this information with graduate programs can help increase the population of URM graduate students.

Diversify international graduate student recruitment

To diversify our international student populations, the Graduate College has initiated discussions with representatives from Brazil and Indonesia about how we can assist with the recruitment, retention, and funding of international graduate students with the goal of increasing applications from well-qualified students from these countries.

IMPACT: Broadening the pipeline for international students decreases the risk associated with over reliance on international recruitment from China and India and increases the diversity of the student body.

We are committed to broadening participation in graduate education, which is integral to excellence in higher education.







The Advanced Digital Sciences Center in Singapore officially opened in Fusionopolis, a science and technology complex developed by Singapore's Agency for Science, Technology and Research, or A*STAR.

Funding Opportunities

The Lemann Institute and CLACS underwrite different research initiatives to advance the knowledge of Brazil among students and faculty at the University of Illinois. For more information about each funding opportunity, please click on the hyperlinks below.

Students

Lemann Graduate Fellowship for Brazilian Studies: This fellowship is awarded annually to UIUC graduate students doing research about Brazil, and provides an annual stipend of \$18,000.00. Applicants should check with their Departments and Schools to verify that their home units offer tuition waivers. The deadline for the submission of proposals is usually in February.

FLAS: This fellowship supports graduate and undergraduate study in modern foreign languages in combination with area studies, international studies, or international or area aspects of professional studies. Awards include a stipend and financial support for tuition and fees, and are available for summer or the entire academic year.

TINKER Field Research Grant: This grant is designed to provide graduate students with their initial exploratory experience in developing independent research projects and conducting field research in Latin America. Funding is provided for travel and research costs for four or more weeks during the summer.

Undergraduate Study Abroad Program in Brazil: Togeth with the Study Abroad Office, the Lemann Institute for Brazilian Studies funds study abroad scholarships to undergraduate students to take courses in Brazilian Institutions and participate in specific study abroad programs aimed at Brazil. The scholarships can be awarded for semester, academic year or the summer and winter breaks. Application and selection is made through the Study Abroad Office. Faculty

Lemann Institute Research Grants for U of I Faculty: The Institute normally offers up to two awards per year, paying up to \$20,000.00 each. However, the value of each award is dependent on the type and scope of the project as well as the budget approved by the Lemann Institute.

Lemann Institute Collaborative Research Grants: The Lemann Institute Collaborative Research Grants have the objective of supporting research proposals between UIUC and Brazilian faculty members. Proposals should focus on Brazilian topics. These Grants are for one year. If resources permit and the quality of proposals is high, up to two awards will be offered per year, paying up to a total of \$20,000.00 each. The value of each award depends on the type and scope of the project as well as the budget approved by the Lemann Institute.

The following opportunities for faculty are offered together with CLACS:

Lemann Brazilian Studies Course Development Awards: The Brazilian Studies Course Development Awards are intended to support faculty developing new courses, or revising existing courses, to include significant Brazilian content. Awards of up to \$3,000 can support travel, the purchase of potential course materials, photocopying, research assistance or similar costs related to the development of the course.

CLACS/Lemann Faculty Travel Awards: The Faculty Travel Awards are intended to support faculty travel overseas for short-term trips to enrich instructional materials, establish and maintain linkages with overseas institutions, and explore promising new lines of research.

CLACS/Lemann Faculty Development Conference Grants: The Faculty Development Conference Grants are intended to help support small conferences or wardshops enabling UI faculty to advance innovative directions in scholarship related to Latin America. Projects involving interdisciplinary and interprofessional collaborations are especially encouraged. Awards of up to \$2,500 can be used to support travel and lodging of invited conference participants, publicity, and dissemination of conference proceedings. Conferences should take place during the 2013-14 academic year.

INTERNATIONAL SAFETY & SECURITY

The University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign places a high priority on the health, safety, and security of students and personnel during their time on campus and when studying or conducting research internationally. To this end, policies, guidelines, and procedures have been drafted to ensure the safety and success of our academic community abroad.

Illinois is one of the early adopters of having a designated staff person who deals exclusively with the safety and security of its students and staff abroad. The daily operations of International Safety and Security staff includes monitoring world events, responding to student, faculty, and staff incidents and needs here and abroad on a 24/7 basis, and increasing the quality of and access to pre-departure training and preparation for those participating in international activities from the Urbana campus. The International Safety and Security staff work closely with the Dean of Students, Public Affairs, the Provost, and the Chancellor.

International Travel Policy

International Safety and Security follows the International Travel Policy outlined in the campus administrative manual, which is managed by the Office of the Provost.

International Insurance

International Safety and Security oversees the distribution of International Insurance for individuals and sponsored travel abroad through the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. Visit the International Insurance page for additional information relevant to your travel status at Illinois.

Who & When We Contact in an Emergency

In the event of an emergency, students are the office's first priority. When contacted due to an emergency, students are instructed to contact their parents. The office will only contact parents when the student is unable to do so.
