Accelerated Graduate Degree Programs

- 19 accelerated masters and one Au.D.
 - 9 in engineering
 - 3 in math/science
 - 3 in health science
 - 2 in social science
 - 2 in fine arts

Accelerated Graduate Degree Programs

- Programs that wish to add an AGDP option must go through the university curriculum process for approval.
- Up to 12 hours of designated 5000 and/or 6000 level courses could be used in both the Bachelor's degree and the graduate degree.
- Students will pay undergraduate tuition for these courses as long as they are undergraduates.



Admission to the AGDP

- Minimal criteria for admission include: a cumulative undergraduate GPA of at least 3.0 based on at least 45 earned hours, 15 of which shall be earned at WMU.
- Students intending to enroll in any AGDP must maintain a 3.0 GPA throughout their baccalaureate degree, or their admission to the AGDP will be revoked.



Advising for the AGDP

- Once admitted, the dept. will send the student and the registrar an AGDP Course Approval form stating which graduate courses may be counted in both degrees.
- Graduate courses substituting for required courses within the undergraduate degree must be designated by the program as equivalent in content but delivered with graduate level rigor.



Administration of the AGDP

- Registration for the graduate courses for the AGDP students is done *manually* by the Registrar's Office.
- The graduate courses, taken while the student is still an undergraduate, will appear on the student's graduate transcript.
- When a student completes their bachelor's degree, the Registrar's Office staff *manually* add the graduate hours earned to the student's undergrad transcript.



4+1 Programs

- Used concept of AGDP to build 4+1 programs with partner institutions.
- Cooperative agreements allow transfer of 6 credits of designated upper level undergraduate course work when students earn B or better.
- These agreements also allow a maximum of 6 graduate credits by credit by examination as credit/no credit course work.
