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

 - Loss of loan subsidies
- Private philanthropy is taking on a increasingly important role





Fundraising: Challenging but not Impossible


- Three simple strategies to follow

 - Outline/develop an overall development plan
 - Annual Giving
 - Major Giving
 - Stewardship

Graduate Education Advancement Board

- Established as an advisory board for The Graduate School in 1990
 - An academic advisory board to promote visibility of graduate education
- Converted to an Advancement Board (GEAB) in 1996
 - A volunteer advancement board to promote fundraising and advocacy for graduate education



GEAB Mission & Membership

- Mission
 - The Graduate Education Advancement Board assists the Graduate School and the University in generating broad support and funding for graduate education at UNC-Chapel Hill
- Membership
 - Significant donors
 - Community/state leaders
 - Alumni in leadership positions
 - Legislators
- Graduate School staff available to public officials on the board
 - Contacted by legislators for information





Board Member Responsibilities

- Attend and contribute to board meetings
- Personally support graduate education at significant level
- Cultivate alumni, friends and business community for support
- Help solicit gifts for the University from others
