How to be an effective advocate?

- Become knowledgeable about your graduate programs so that you can speak passionately about the issues
- Find opportunities to make the case for graduate education
- Highlight graduate student successes
- Be prepared to articulate the message and needs

What does advocacy look like?

- Informing key campus constituents about issues (e.g. ACA, FLSA, financial aid)
 - Meetings (Provost, deans, HR, GEMC, GPDs)
 - Communicate with federal liaison
 - Memos
 - Social media (blogs, twitter)
- Highlight graduate education
 - Website
 - Flyers
 - Brochures




