



# Open Doors 1948/49–2008/09 Celebrating 60 years

25,464 international students were studying in the U.S. in 1948/49, less than 4% of today's total.



#### International Students in the U.S.

- Annual survey of international students at U.S. campuses
- Population: Both undergraduate and graduate students
- Timeframe: 2008/09 enrollments
- Respondents: Regionally and nationally accredited U.S. higher education institutions



# Comparison of *Open Doors* and CGS Surveys

#### **Open Doors**

- Fall 2008
- Enrollment only
- Undergraduate, graduate, non-degree and OPT
- ~3,000 institutions surveyed (accredited HE institutions)
- Since 1954

#### **CGS Survey**


- Fall 2009
- Applications, admissions and enrollments
- Graduate only
- ~500 institutions surveyed (CGS members)
- Since 2004





#### International Student Enrollment, 2008/09


**Total** international enrollment **increased 8%** to **671,616**. **Graduate** international enrollment **increased 3%** to **283,329**.





# Academic Level Trends, 1988/89 – 2008/09


42% of international students are graduate students.





### New Enrollment, 2008/09

**New** international student enrollment increased **16%** in 2008/09. **New graduate** enrollments increased **8%**.










## Origins of Graduate International Students, 2008/09





#### Place of Origin Trends – Graduate Students








# Types of Institutions, 2008/09


**Doctorate institutions** host the largest number of international students (59% of the total).





#### U.S. Host Institutions, 2008/09

- 81% of graduate international students are enrolled at large institutions with over 10,000 students.
- 61.5% are enrolled at public institutions and 38.5% at private institutions.










#### **U.S. Study Abroad**

- Annual survey of U.S. student participation in study abroad for academic credit (since 1985)
- **Timeframe**: Study during the 2007/08 academic year (including summer 2008) lag due to credit transfer
- Respondents: U.S. higher education institutions awarding credit for study abroad
- Who is counted? U.S. citizens and permanent residents enrolled at an accredited U.S. higher education institution where they received academic credit for study abroad



#### U.S. Study Abroad, 2007/08


**262,416** U.S. students studied abroad in 2007/08. **10.5%** were graduate students.






### Study Abroad Destinations, 2007/08

**Europe** remains the leading host region for U.S. students studying abroad, with **56%** of the total.






# Study Abroad Destinations, 2007/08





#### Duration of Study Abroad, 1993/94- 2007/08



**Short-term**: Summer, January term, 8 weeks or less during the school year


Mid-length: One quarter, two quarters, one semester

**Long-term**: Academic year, calendar year
