Schools of Public Health by the Numbers

- 49 CEPH-Accredited Schools
- 2 new schools per year
- 26,343 Students
- 11,593 Faculty (4300 FT)
- 74% Master's Degrees
- 26% Doctoral Degrees
- 15% Foreign
- 71% Female

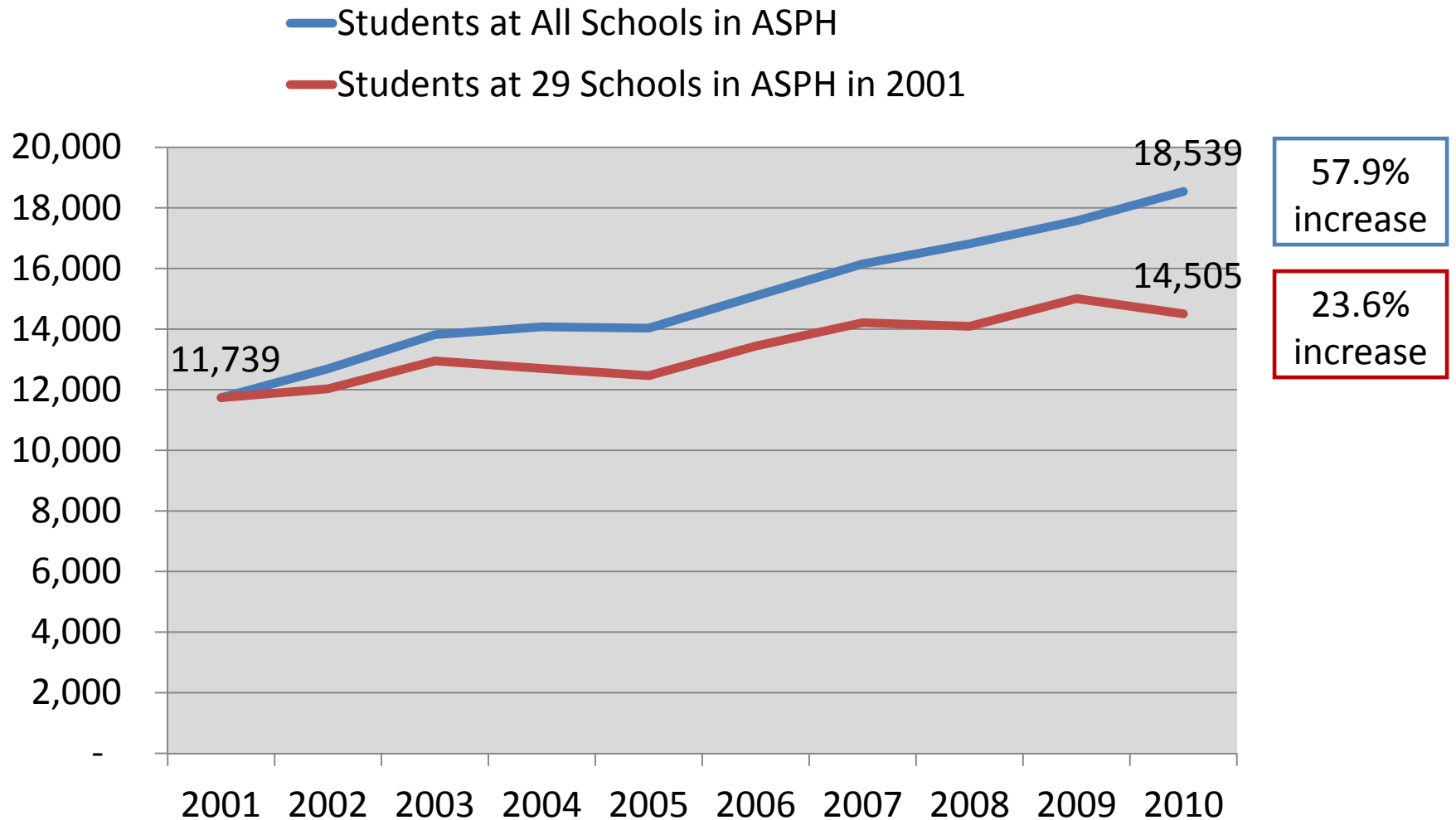

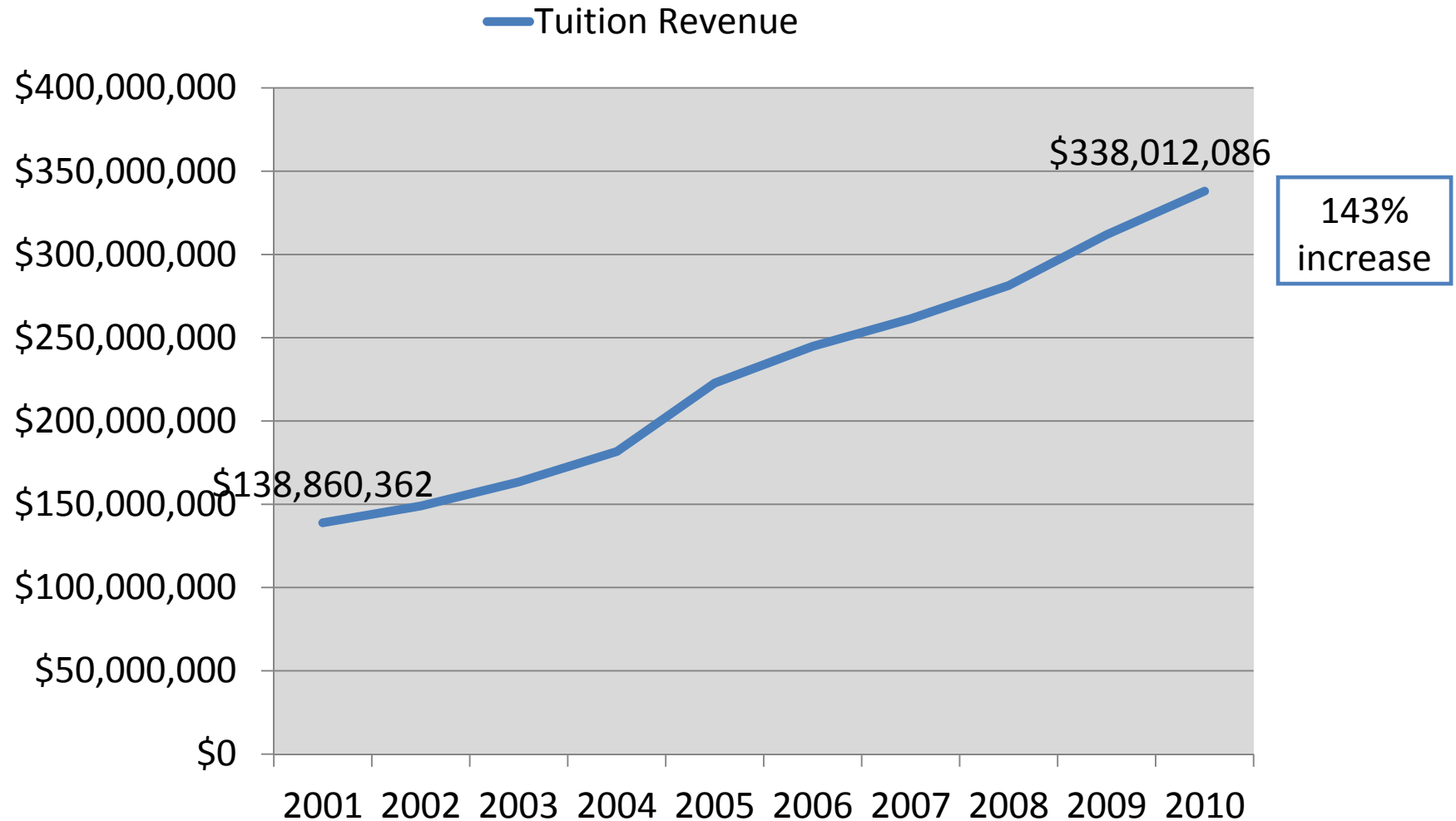
Inflation-adjusted annual tuition for graduate degrees at schools of public health, 2002 and 2010

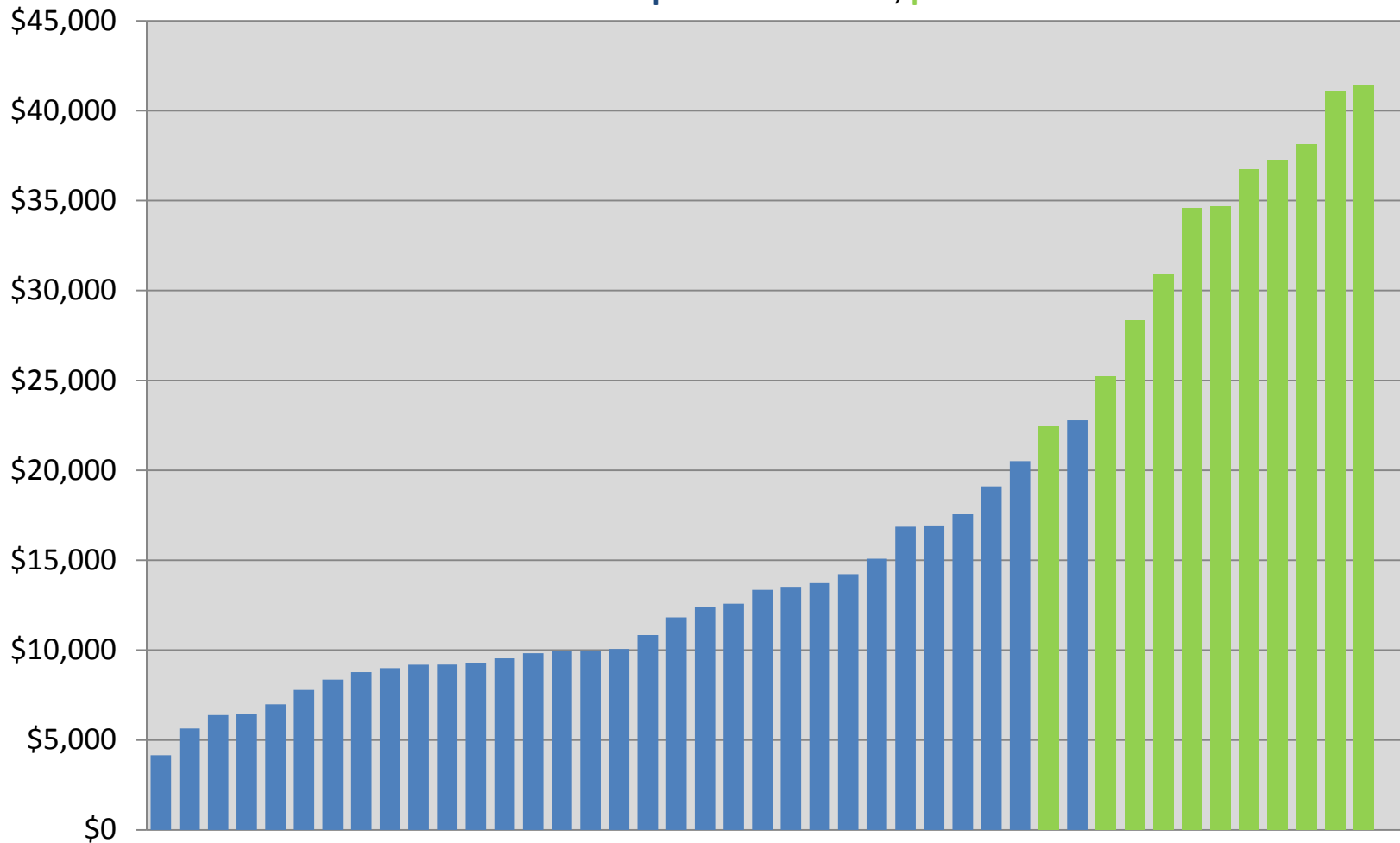
Tuition as Revenue for SPH

2011 SPH Graduate Survey cont.

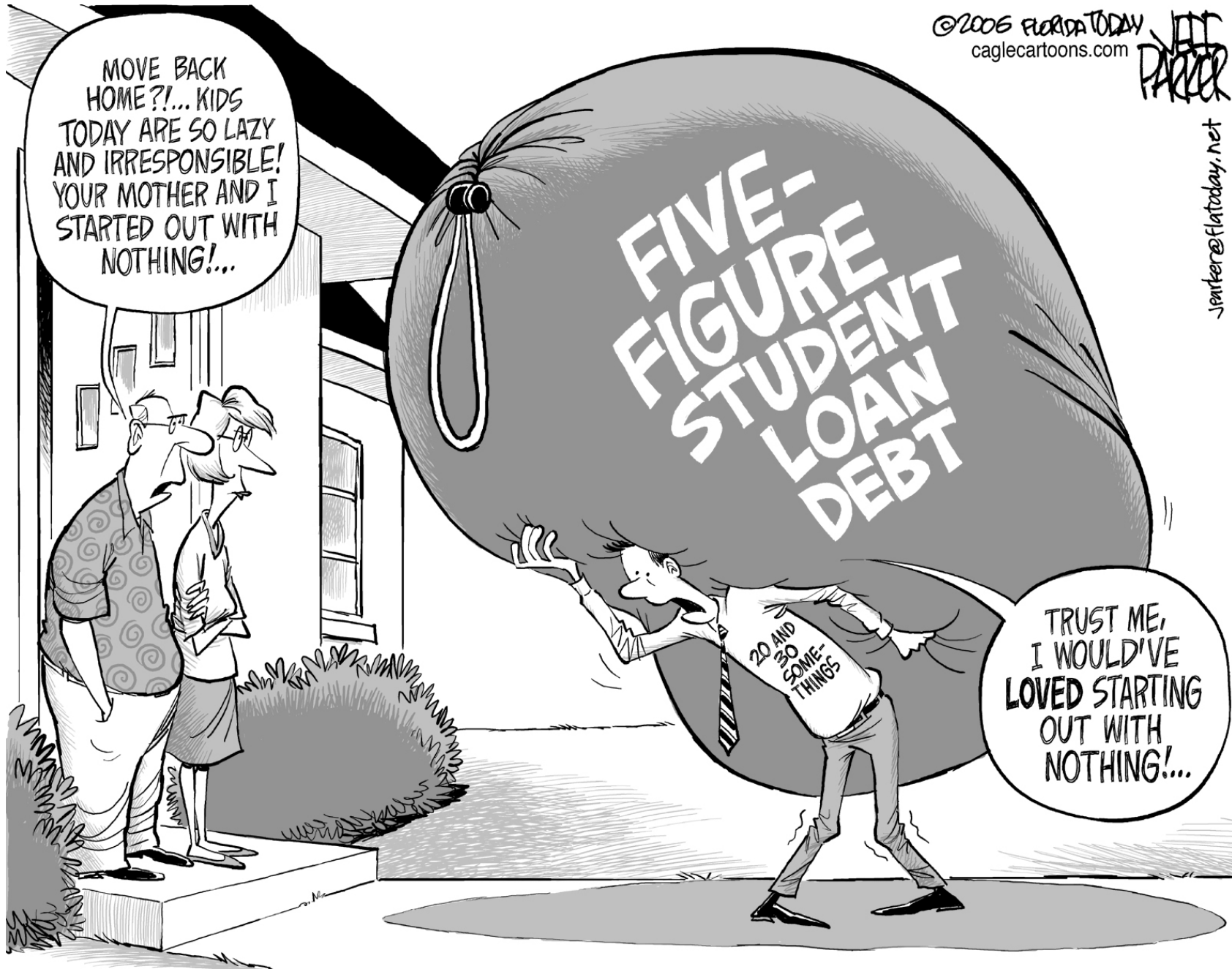
93% of Employed Work in Public Health
