The Graduate Council

- A committee of and appointed by the Academic Senate
- Sets standards for admission
- Develops academic policy
- Approves new programs and changes to degree requirements
- Conducts periodic reviews of graduate programs
- Selects recipients for university-wide fellowships and awards




Working with the Graduate Council

Maintaining Quality with Fewer Resources

- Reduce administrative transaction work
- Streamline and simplify policies and approval processes – fewer forms!
- Eliminate need for policy exceptions and prior approval
- Promote program initiative
- Restructure staff to avoid duplication of effort
- Encourage Graduate Council to focus on big, philosophical issues not detailed academic policy



Changing Focus of the Graduate Office

- Provide academic leadership for graduate education
 - Offer classes in laboratory management, scholarly integrity, entrepreneurship, etc.
 - Promote faculty engagement in thinking about graduate education more deeply
 - Share best practices in graduate education
- Promote graduate student, postdoc and faculty diversity



Changing Focus of the Graduate Office

- Focus on programs, not individual students
- Define a culture of success that is based on success of all students, not the few "best" students
 - Confront reality of completion data
 - Align definition of success with program's definition & goals
 - Provide data and analyses to inform resource allocations and program review
 - Provide information, tools and training to enable success
