




- Private; Liberal Arts

Organization of the Ten Duke Schools Comprehensive Graduate School



Executive Committee of the Graduate School (ECGF)

- 4 representatives from each of the 4 divisions (as defined by the Graduate School): Humanities, Social Sciences, Physical Sciences, Biological Sciences.
- Representatives elected for 2 years, staggered terms.

Responsibilities of ECGF

- Approve new programs (PhD, Master's, Certificate and Admitting).
- Review graduate degree programs every 6 years (the degree program reviews are part of broader reviews of departments and programs mandated by the Provost).
- Advise the Dean on graduate education policy.

Some advantages of our model

- Graduate School Dean has a seat at the table with other 9 Deans.
- Centralized Responsible Conduct of Research training; required for graduation
- Can facilitate interdisciplinary program development, strategic thinking
- Centralized student services, admissions, tracking of academic progress, diversity programs (*Tracking Degree Placement & Career Progression*)
- Oversight of *quality* of programs and students

Emerging issues

- Assessment of graduate programsrecently implemented, in transition.
- Development and fundraising newly formed alumni board
- Advocacy NC Conference of Graduate School
